If dyslexia runs in your family, you may know that your child has dyslexia long before professionals do.

Dyslexia is a Learning Difference:

If dyslexia runs in your family, you may know that your child has dyslexia long before professionals are ready to acknowledge it or support and assess them. However, it is increasingly evident that early intervention is critical, so here are the warning signs and how you can give your child the best start.





1. Poor phonological awareness

- ✓ Difficulty perceiving the individual sounds in words.
- ✓Late talker. May continue to be a quiet child.
- ✓ Unclear speech (e.g. 'duce' for juice, 'wabit' for rabbit, 'busgety' for spaghetti, 'baftub' for bathtub)
- ✓ May not pick up on rhyme (e.g. "box, fox, ___?")

2. Poor working memory

- ✓ Difficulty 'holding' information in short-term memory and doing anything with it.
- ✓ They may quickly forget new words and names and have difficulty remembering multistage directions. (e.g. get your coat and bag, and come downstairs)

3. Poor rapid retrieval skills

- ✓Difficulty accessing the information in the brain quickly and automatically.
- ✓ Difficulty remembering common sequences such as the order of numbers, letters of the alphabet, or the order of the days of the week.
- ✓ Frequently uses imprecise words like 'thing,' 'stuff,' 'it,' or 'he.'

It is important to compare your child to other children of the same age. It is also important to note that exceptionally verbal and bright students can hide a lot of dyslexic difficulties. **Teach Tutor Train Transform**
